Shelter Manager's Report



Our shelter is three years old! We are well and truly embedding ourselves in the community and forging solid relationships with other services in the domestic and family violence sector. It has been another incredible year as we continue to grow and welcome new families into the PWS fold. Our team is also expanding, and we are joined by two wonderful social workers, Sali and Lucie, who have hit the ground running and are providing quality and skilled case management support to our women and children. It really is an honor to lead this team of dedicated women who hold feminist values that ultimately underpin the core of our service provision.

Domestic and Family violence continues to be the leading cause of women's homelessness and our service is committed to delivering a specialist response for our clients. We cannot fight this scourge alone; it takes a whole-of-community response to end gendered violence and we work closely with our community and other domestic and family violence specialists in the sector to improve outcomes for those in our care. Unfortunately, we are still seeing more than one woman a week being murdered by a partner or former partner, or family member.

There is much more to do in this space, and we need significant investment in prevention, early intervention, crisis response, and recovery and healing.

Technological abuse is on the rise and gives further platforms to abusers to exert power and control over those they purport to love and care about. Our membership with WESNET - The Women's Services Network enables us to stay up to date on tech safety and access training and resources for our case workers. This organisation also delivers a program where our clients receive free Uber rides so they can attend, court, counselling, or other key appointments at no cost to them.

Coming out of the Covid 19 pandemic, we are starting to see a significant shortage of rental properties and a rise in the cost of living. Our families are directly impacted by these issues and are often discriminated against when applying for rental accommodation as they move on from shelter. We are grateful to our partners, The PAYCE Foundation and the Uniting Centenary Church, Parramatta for providing properties for our families after they move on from crisis accommodation. These wonderful houses allow us to provide safe, longer term transitional housing for large families and their pets. We know how important it is for all the family to stay together, and this includes fur and feathered babies.

We continue to have a wonderful partnership with Two-Good Co. that deliver healthy, delicious meals every week and beautiful care packs that welcome our women when they arrive. This helps mums by alleviating the stress and cost of cooking a meal and the kids love their yummy dinners! The West Ryde Anglican Church also continue to bring us fresh fruit and veggies from their co-op each week, again, a big cost saver for all and provides nutrient dense food for our clients.

Shelter Manager's Report



We have close relationships with our local early education centres, primary and high schools and they are quick to escalate enrollments for the kids and provide them with free uniforms for the first day of school. This can be a daunting experience and with the help of our amazing donors (including Sisters of Mercy and Officeworks) we can ensure that the kids have new shoes, backpacks, and stationery for their big day.

The Child Support team work tirelessly to provide fun, educational, and sensory experiences for our kids, and you can read more about what we do in the Child Support Report as well as seeing our kids and the team having lots of fun.

The support we receive from schools that have undertaken the Walk the Talk program is simply incredible! The program, delivered through Women's Community Shelters, gives children in years 9 and 10 education in healthy and respectful relationships. During the informative and fun workshops, the children are encouraged to become change agents and adopt a local shelter. They then devise creative ways to fundraise for us, and we have received cash donations, food, gift and experience vouchers, art packs, self-care packs, and gifts for those special times of celebration throughout the year. We'd like to thank Santa Sabina College, Tara Anglican Girls School, James Ruse Agricultural College, and Mitchell High School for their ongoing and continued support. Our team visit the schools and talk to the students after they have finished the workshops. These kids really get behind us and it's wonderful to hear their super creative ideas and see their passion firsthand.

We are also committed to providing community education through various means. This includes speaking at schools or DFV awareness raising events, and through our representation on several interagency committees. During the 16 Days of Activism to End Gendered Violence, in November / Dec 22, we were part of the working group that organised the Race to Safety in Parramatta/Cumberland LGA's. The event was loosely based on the Amazing Race television show and brought together teams that were required to navigate and work through a maze of services. The teams learnt by experiencing firsthand the complexities of accessing domestic and family violence services with a limited budget and little resources. Something that women must do every day. Thanks to Belle Property, our incredible supporters, for their enthusiastic engagement on the day.

A special shout out to our hardworking volunteer Mel, who gives her time once a week to help us with, literally, anything we ask. She is an expert at sorting out our donations, helping us turnover houses, is a specialist gurney operator, and has superior admin skills. We are lucky to have her on our team!

Most importantly, it is the women and children who put their trust in us and share their stories of strength, resilience and resistance who deserve the biggest applause! We are honored and privileged to work alongside you all and you are what keep us doing what we do.

Team Feedback



I started working at PWS in March of 2023. This was my first fulltime role after completing my social work and criminology degrees. The first thing I noticed when I walked into the PWS office was the warmth and safety of the space. The walls were plastered in the kid's artworks, and it was instantly obvious what incredible work occurred at PWS. From my first day, I felt incredibly welcomed, supported and encouraged by my colleagues and our amazing manager Tania. It is such a privilege and honour to work alongside a team who embody the same values that are so important to me - intersectional feminism and anti-oppressive practice that is strengths based and trauma informed. I wouldn't be able to get through the really tough days on the job if it wasn't for the support, care and love of the PWS team.

I have learnt so much from the strength, resistance, resilience and struggle of our clients who fight tirelessly for their children, and it is such an honour to be a witness to a little part of their journey. All the children and young people we get to work with blow me away every single day and it is such a joy and comfort seeing them playing with smiles on their faces. It is also a privilege to witness everyday instances of mums fiercely protecting and loving their children in so many different ways. While I love the 'big' moments, such as a client moving into their own home which is safe and free from violence, it is actually the 'little' moments such as a mum cuddling her child which I enjoy the most.

This work can be incredibly challenging and at times, the violence and control of the patriarchy seems insurmountable, but it is the PWS team and the beautiful women and children we support who keep the fire in my belly to continue to fight for equity and safety.

Supporting woman who are working to rebuild their lives and navigating trauma is an immense privilege. This work can be challenging and intense. However, being part of a team like the one here at PWS is integral to the positive shelter's outcomes, but also to the wellbeing of the staff and clients throughout their engagement with our service.

The working environment at PWS is not only supportive, but also encouraging. Rather than a feeling of 'hierarchy' there is a deep sense of togetherness when it comes to problem solving and crisis management.

A day in the life of a case worker at PWS can involve a variety of tasks from making phone calls to advocate for a client's needs, accompanying a client to an appointment and facilitating creative activities for children. This diversity in the workday brings with it many rewarding moments when a case worker gets to interact with a client outside of a formal case meeting. These moments of support and connection are what build the positive workplace culture within the service.

Our Dedicated Network







Women's Community Shelters (WCS) works with local communities to empower them to change our collective attitudes to homelessness and domestic and family violence and take positive action against them.

In 2019 the network's strategic focus was to broaden the support we offer on either side of shelter accommodation, securing funding for outreach support and negotiating partnerships to provide housing and employment pathways.

Across the WCS network, staff members participated in training to support our reporting on client outcomes; attended conferences and events to support their delivery of trauma informed, client-centred service; and extended their knowledge and skills through a range of Specialist Homelessness Services training opportunities. As a network, we began developing our inaugural Reconciliation Action Plan. Across the network, shelters invested in the professional development of their staff with all staff supported through learning and development opportunities as and where possible.



Overview of Support Provided




Main Income Source when Presenting

Parramatta Women's Shelter Inc Notes to the Financial Statements For the Financial Year Ended 30 June 2023

1. General information

The financial statements cover Parramatta Women's Shelter Inc, an entity incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The entity is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards and a registered charity under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the NSW Charitable Fundraising Act 1991.

The entity's principal activity is being a community-led shelter that assists women and children escaping domestic and family violence and homelessness.

The financial report was authorised for issue by Committee on 5 September 2023

2. Changes in accounting policies

New and revised standards that are effective for these financial statements

A number of revised standards became effective for the first time to annual periods beginning on or after 1 July 2022. The adoption of these revised accounting standards has not had a material impact on the entity's financial statements.

Accounting Standards issued but not yet effective and not been adopted early by the entity

A number of new and revised standards have been issued but are not yet effective and have not been adopted early by the entity. The Committee is currently assessing the impact such standards will have on the entity.

3. Summary of significant accounting policies

Financial reporting framework

The general purpose financial statements of the entity have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the NSW Charitable Fundraising Act 1991.

Statement of compliance

The general purpose financial statements of the entity have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of this report are as follows:

The financial statements are presented in Australian Dollars (\$AUD), which is also the functional currency of the company.

Revenue

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the entity expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.



Parramatta Women's Shelter Inc Notes to the Financial Statements For the Financial Year Ended 30 June 2023

Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Other revenue

For any revenue streams that are not defined as contracts with customers, then the revenue is recognised when the entity gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably.

Operating expenses

Operating expenses are recognised in profit or loss upon utilisation of the service or at the date of their origin.

Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax as a registered charity under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash on hand equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and any impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to its estimated recoverable amount recognised either in profit or loss.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of fixed asset Depreciation rate
Plant and equipment 20% - 100%
Motor vehicles 17%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period the entity determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the entity prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to the short-term nature, they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

Provision for employee benefits

Provision is made for the entity's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

Liabilities relating to contracts with customers

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is recognised if a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the entity transfers the related goods or services/grant conditions are fulfilled. Contract liabilities include deferred income. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the entity performs under the contract (i.e. transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer/fulfils conditions of the grant).

The services are usually provided/conditions usually fulfilled within twelve (12) months of receipt of the payment/grant. Where the amount received is in respect of services to be provided over a period that exceeds twelve (12) months after the reporting date/the conditions will only be satisfied more than twelve (12) months after the reporting date, the liability is discounted and presented as non-current.

Comparative figures

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.
